

## **S** What is the **SUBJECT**?

What is the main topic of discussion? Describe in 2-3 words the topic of the piece.

## **O** What is the **OCCASION**?

On what occasion is this being written? What historical context is there? Is there a motive for the writing? What other information is relevant to this writing?

## **A** Who is the **AUDIENCE**?

To whom or for whom is this being written? Audience helps determine diction and style.

## **P** What is the **PURPOSE**?

Why is this being written? Is it to persuade, to argue, to inform, to provide humor, or relate a personal story? Is there some other purpose?

## **S** Who is the **SPEAKER**?

What are the speaker's credentials or reliability (ethos)? Does he or she have something to say that adds relevant information to the subject?

**SOAP S** is a strategy that can be used for either interpreting a text or as a guide for writing a text. Based on Aristotle's triangle, it is used to be sure that all the bases are covered when writing and all the main elements are taken into account when interpreting a text.

Helpful guidelines for **READING**:

What is the speaker's assertion/question?

What are the pros and cons?

Helpful guidelines for **WRITING**:

What is your assertion (position)?

What are your reasons and support?

How can you target your audience?

Some **RHETORICAL PATTERNS**:

It is true that ... however ... therefore

Admittedly ... on the other hand ... so

Of course ... nevertheless ... as a result

Obviously ... on the contrary ... finally
